2. Evidence base and the key principles of the Pinnies initiative

National research and how Pinnies is trying to improve the lives of Mencap service users and increase the opportunities available to them

National research by Mencap

1. People with learning disabilities have fewer chances to take part in leisure activities or socialise with their peers, and so many have fewer friends

Pinnies provides a safe space for our service users to socialise with their peers and feel part of their community. Something that most of us take for granted but for people with learning disabilities is not easy to find. Pinnies is the only business offering this kind of integrated facility for people with learning disabilities in the area.

The Pinnies initiative is overseen and run by Rica Scott who has more then 25 years experience and knowledge of supporting adults with learning disabilities. This makes the project unique in comparison to the alternative work based placements available to adults with learning disabilities. These placements are sadly difficult to find, even more so in a post pandemic working environment.

As well as Rica's extensive knowledge there are a number of permanent staff who are well established employees who through their work at Pinnies have a indepth understanding of the valuable contributions people with learning disabilities can make and how to support our service users to achieve their goals.

2. Being physically present in a community does not necessarily mean people with a learning disability feel integrated within their community or accepted by their peers. Social inclusion involves making meaningful connections and participation in fulfilling activities

Everyone is treated as equal in Pinnies. Our service users who visit are served by their peers alongside the Pinnies employees. Not only does this provide a familiar face but can act as inspiration for their own life goals. Externally it sends out a strong message of inclusion and accessibility for everyone. We know people with learning disabilities are massively underrepresented in the workplace and Pinnies is here to show that shouldn't be the case and is unacceptable. People visit Pinnies for great service, delicious food but also to contribute to the charity's fantastic work.

3. Evidence suggests that having more and better quality friendships is associated with better physical health and lower risk of early mortality

At Pinnies we are a family, every one of the team makes a valuable contribution to the business. We can see noticeable

positive change in our service users in terms of confidence, social skills, communication and physical skills. Equally those service users who visit the shop are comfortable and relaxed in the setting enjoying time with peers and the wider community. Friendships are formed within an integrated setting and our customers have a much better understanding of the incredible capabilities of people with a learning disability. As well as the valuable contributions they make in society, if given the opportunity.

5. Project lead statement - Rica Scott

I have worked for Huntingdon Mencap for 25 years. My own son has a learning disability, he struggled through school and then experienced many knock backs because employers only saw the learning disability label.

It took just one person to make a difference, who took the time to get to know what my son could offer and they gave him a chance. He has made a success of his life.

When we opened Pinnies we wanted to give people who are disadvantaged an opportunity to developed skills and be proud of their abilities. We never look at the label just the person in front of us. We take their base line skills and build from there.

It's been a privilege to see young people come for work experience with limited skills, little confidence and avoid social interaction, gradually build their skills become confident enough to speak to customers and eventually decide that they want to go to college or find work in the catering industry.

Over the last 10 years we have helped over 30 young people achieve academic qualifications in the catering industry.

Many have gone onto further education then catering college. Many are now in gainful employment.

I feel this is something to be very proud of.
